Actively directed the care of up to 14 medical and surgical ICU patients, admitting and discussing differential diagnoses, diagnostic approaches, and treatment algorithms with overnight housestaff, modeling and supervising invasive procedures.

Led the recruitment effort towards matching the following year's interns. Developed restorative opportunities, provided counsel, and facilitated conflict resolution.

As a hospital appointed physician, attended on the Medicine ward service a total of 3 months. Acted as the primary outpatient and inpatient attending physician to a panel of patients accrued at the hospital-based continuity clinic over the course of residency training. Functioned as preceptor to the housestaff in their ambulatory care of patients.
